Snow conditions and open terrain were not ideal due to a lower-than-normal snowpack but that was offset by the strong desires and skiers' spirits to just be out on the mountain and carving turns (and a few rocks). It was good to meet up with fellow Snowdrifters on the mountain and during our numerous meetups at the resort. This is what our ski trips are all about – skiing fun, new experiences, and enjoying with friends. Thanks to our Trip Leaders !!!

Our Val di Fassa/Sicily Italy trip will be underway with the publishing of this Newsletter. In February, we have a day trip to Chestnut Mountain on February 10th and the Winter Park trip leaving on February 24th. For those Snowdrifters attending these upcoming ski trips and our trips in March, get ready to have a great time.

During the 2023 ski season many resorts saw record snowfall. The start of the 2024 ski season has experienced below normal snowfall. Unfortunately, our weekend family trip to the Porcupine Mountains had to be cancelled due to a lack of sufficient snow. The long-term reliability of snow conditions may become more uncertain if we experience a warming climate. Based on a recent article I read in the Atlantic (*The Threshold at Which Snow Starts Irreversibly Disappearing*), one degree temperature increase can have a nonlinear impact on reduced yearly snow totals. This means once temperatures increase past a certain threshold, snow loss can change fast, i.e., a "snow loss cliff." Some areas of the Northeast have begun to experience this. And yet the US West is now currently receiving lots of snow with some resorts closing for avalanche mitigation. With snowfall uncertainty, some resorts are experimenting with "snow harvesting." Essentially, they stockpile snow and cover it with an insulating blanket/material to reduce snow evaporation and melting allowing them to reuse the snow during the season and/or into the next season. PRAY FOR SNOW!

We are starting to think about trips for the 2025 ski season and will begin the trip planning soon. Your input is welcome. Some ideas for 2024 summer meetup events are also coming forward. One idea is to attend the Crosstown Classic between the White Sox and Cubs. We would like to see one of our members volunteer to lead this event, with assistance from one of our past event leaders.

Enjoy and stay safe for the 2024 Ski Season! See photo on right. Thanks to "AI" I am already enjoying the skiing in the Dolomites.

Trip Coordinators' Corner:



We're off to a GREAT ski season! Our trip to Big Sky was a huge success through the efforts of the Trip Leaders and participants. We all are looking forward to the remaining ski trips this season. It is approaching that time of year when we are starting to evaluate trips for 2025. We will be looking into trips to Snowmass and other Western destinations, including Canada as well as Europe. Also, we are considering two trips that the Club has never done in the past - a Tour/Ski trip to New Zealand and Australia and a Ski/Tour trip to Japan. These trips are still in the initial

planning stages; however, we plan to send out a survey to obtain your interest in them. A brief description of these two trips follows:

New Zealand, Australia and Cairns-SEPT 1st – 15th, 2024

This may be your once in a life time opportunity to see New Zealand and Australia. We are considering a September tour/ski trip to New Zealand and Australia including a 4-day ski experience in New Zealand. Trip will include 5 nights in New Zealand and 4 nights in Sydney and 5 nights in Cairns with many opportunities for tourism.

This is your chance to ski New Zealand, or take a Jet Boat ride, Bungee Jump, Lord of Rings tour, etc. Australia provides a tour of Sydney, Opera House, Rocks area, wine country or mountains. Cairns provides an opportunity to cruise, snorkel/scuba the GREAT BARRIER, and ride the Kuranda Train and see the rain forest.

Queenstown, a region of exceptional and diverse beauty, is a leading resort in the South Island, with inveterate world travelers regarding it as one of the premier scenic areas in the world. Backed by steep mountains, Queenstown lies in the curve of Lake Wakatipu at the head of its own small horse-shoe shaped bay. It is the South Island's principal resort, drawing visitors the year round with its lake and mountain scenery, exhilarating climate, changing seasons and wide range of excursion possibilities.

Sydney, the capital of New South Wales was founded in 1788 and is Australia's oldest city. Sydney sits astride Port Jackson, one of the most beautiful deepwater harbors in the world. With a population of just over 4 million, Sydney is also Australia's largest city. The city boasts famous landmarks such as the Harbor Bridge and the Sydney Opera House, as well as a fine array of restaurants, theatres, shopping complexes and some of Australia's best surfing beaches.

Cairns is the capital of Tropical North Queensland - where the rainforest meets the reef, Cairns is the gateway to the tropical wilderness rainforest and spectacular Great Barrier Reef. Set between the stunning twin backdrops of the mountain ranges and a sparkling Coral Sea, Cairns has the sophistication of resorts, restaurants, entertainment, and boutique shopping all within a lush tropical setting.

We are planning for a group size around 26 with an estimated cost, including some tours, at \$3,500 plus air. We are waiting for airline costs.

Hotels include stays at NOVOTEL Lakefront hotel in Queenstown NZ, Australia, Sydney lodging is at RYDGES hotel and at Cairns HOTEL CRYSTAL BROOKE RILEY.

JAPAN SKI TRIP – January/February 2025

We are currently working with the Sanctuary Ski Club to put together a ski trip to Japan for 24 people in late January, 2025 or Mid-February, 2025. We are currently collecting bids. Right now, the approximate cost looks to be around \$5,000, unfortunately we cannot predict airfare cost and they are suggesting it may go down. The proposals are for seven nights at Hilton Niseko/5-day skiing at Niseko United (on Ikon pass) and a one day of skiing Rusutsu with transportation. There would be three nights in Tokyo prior to heading up to ski. Airfare is roundtrip from O'Hare to Tokyo and roundtrip Tokyo to Sapporo with transportation, all with Nippon Airways. We will be doing a Club survey soon to see who is interested in going to make sure we have enough people to make the trip go.

Niseko, is located approximately two hours from Sapporo by car, Niseko is the go-to place for many skiers and snowboarders across the country and the world. There are many ski resorts throughout Niseko, as well as some of the finest powder snow in the world.

Niseko started to develop following the 1972 Winter Olympics in Sapporo, with state-of-theart ski lifts, gondolas, restaurants, and lodges built in the 1980s. However, Niseko really started to boom during the early 2000s and in 2013, won the World Ski Award for Best Ski Resort in Japan for the first time and then again in 2014, 2015 and in 2016. It quickly became popular with people worldwide as they wanted to get a piece of the powder action. Now, many internationals live in Niseko, with the majority being Australian. You can find many ski and snowboard instructors, rental shops, and guides to help you with your stay in Niseko, making it one of the most user-friendly ski resorts, no matter your level, in the country. There are four main ski resorts in Niseko: Annupuri, Hanazono, Hirafu, and Niseko Village. All have easy access to the slopes as well as plenty of luxury hotels, condominiums, and lodges.

4 WAYS TO REDUCE FOOD WASTE AT HOME

Consumer food waste is a worldwide challenge, but a few habits and changes at home can make a huge difference!

1. COMPOST YOUR LEFTOVERS

Composting speeds up the decomposition process by providing an ideal environment for microorganisms to do their work. They turn your food scraps into compost, a nutrient-rich substance which can nourish houseplants and gardens.

2. USE MEAT BONES OR VEGETABLE SCRAPS TO MAKE A BROTH

If you have leftover chicken, beef or pork bones, try making a broth! Bone broth is used in various cultures around the world as a medicinal food. It has many health benefits including supporting digestive health. It's also a common base for many soups and sauces. This works great with vegetable scraps, too!

3. FREEZE FOOD TO MAKE IT LAST LONGER

Don't let your leftovers go to waste! Freeze them to prevent spoiling. This works great for soups, sauces, seafood, fruit, meat and even milk.

4. UNDERSTAND "BEST BY" DATES

According to the USDA, there are no uniform or universally accepted descriptions used on food labels in the U.S. Many shelf-stable foods are fine to consume after the date printed on the packaging.

"Best if Used By/Before" date indicates when a product will be of best flavor or quality. "Sell-By" date tells the store how long to display the product for sale for inventory management. "Use-By" date is the last date recommended for the use of the product while at peak quality. "Freeze-By" date indicates when a product should be frozen to maintain peak quality.

None of these dates indicate safety around consumption of food, with the exception of dates on infant formula.

Japanese Cucumber Salad

from The Diabetes Cookbook: 300 Recipes for Healthy Living, by Lara Rondinelli-Hamilton and Jennifer Bucko Lamplough, published by American Diabetes Association, 2018

Serve this salad as a vegetable side dish with grilled fish or chicken and a side of brown rice.

Ingredients:

1 medium cucumber

- 1 Tbs rice vinegar
- 1 Tbs extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 tsp honey or packet of artificial sweetener
- ¼ tsp salt 1 Tbs sesame seeds, toasted
- 1. Peel the cucumber to leave alternating green stripes. Slice the cucumber in half lengthwise and scrape the seeds out with a spoon.
- 2. Using a mandoline, food processor or knife, slice the cucumber into very thin slices.
- 3. In a medium bowl, whisk together the vinegar, olive oil, honey or artificial sweetener, and salt.
- 4. Toss the cucumbers and sesame seeds in the dressing and serve.

Chef Jen's Tip:

You can find a reasonably priced handheld slicer (also called a mandoline) in any kitchen supply store. Using one will make preparing this salad really easy and make the texture consistent.

Big Sky Resort is the beating heart of the mountain. The resort boasts 5.850 acres of skiable terrain and 4.359 vertical drop spanning four different mountains. Sounds great, doesn't it? Well, when we arrived only 111 of the 317 total runs were open. We learned that "rocks are snow too" which was posted at one of the on-mountain restaurants. We did find rocks lurking under the light snow cover that Stan coined "Endangered Rock Turtles" (we all know Stan has a quick wit and a way with words) by the end of the

Winter Park Resort

Winter Park Resort is a year-round resort located about a ninety minute drive from Denver, CO. The mountain opened in 1940. The resort consists of three interconnected mountain peaks which share a common lift ticket. There is skiing for all abilities, from beginner to tree skiing and moguls, and it was voted "Best Ski Resort in North America" in 2018 and 2019. There are 23 lifts, and a skiable area of 3081 acres.

For nearly 70 years, a popular way for Denver residents to arrive was by the Ski Train, which arrives right at the resort's base area. It stopped operating for a time in 2009, but it's running again, re-started in 2017 as the Winter Park Express. For us non-Denver residents, we will board the "California Zephyr" in Naperville, which uses the same tracks as the Express out of Denver, and takes us right into Winter Park.

Lodging

The Vintage Hotel is located in the center of the Winter Park ski village. The ski resort is reached by a 5 minute ride on the free Village Cabriolet cable car. In the evenings guests can enjoy beverages at the Five Mountain Tavern, the hotel's lounge bar. A ski storage service is provided daily and free Wi-Fi is provided in all common areas.



Note: In some cases, unexpected expenses, taxes, or charges beyond our control may be incurred on a trip. In such cases, trip prices will be adjusted accordingly.

A little Olympic history - READ THIS!!

Through the early 1900s Lake Placid drew increasing attention as a world-class destination for winter sports. Then in 1920 Lake Placid secured its first globally sanctioned event – the International Outdoor Speed Skating Championships. The success of this event put Lake Placid on the winter sports map.

The Lake Placid Club also built in 1920 the area's first ski jump, located at the current Intervales site. No one could have known at that time that simple 35-meter jump would eventually become all that the Olympic Jumping Complex is today, yet in hindsight the excitement of the first jumping competition could have been seen as a signal.



Not long thereafter, the community's leadership made the remarkable happen. With the region's reputation firmly established, Lake Placid made its bid for and was chosen to host the third ever Olympic Winter Games in 1932.

The three-tiered podium was first introduced at the 1932 Lake Placid Games, and the first gold medalist to take the podium was Lake Placid's own Jack Shea, born and raised in Lake Placid, he became a hometown hero when he won gold medals in the 500- and 1500-meter speed skating races in the 1932 Olympics. He is also the father of Jim Shea (Innsbruck 1964), and grandfather of Jim Shea Jr. (Salt Lake City 2002).

After Lake Placid wins the bid in 1974 to host the 1980 Winter Games, its sports legacy took another giant leap forward. Televised around the world, the 1980 Games gave us some of the most inspiring performances and unforgettable moments in the history of winter sports.

Not only is Lake Placid known as the location for the "Miracle on Ice" where the US Hockey team beat the Russian team but also the location of Eric Heiden winning US won gold in the 500m, 1000m, 1500m, 5000m, and 10,000m speed skating events, setting four Olympic records and one world record in the process. He became the first person to win all five speed skating events and the first of only three to win five gold medals in individual events at a single Games (Summer or Winter). To this day, Heiden remains the only athlete to win five gold medals at one Winter Games. <u>https://lakeplacidlegacysites.com/history/</u>
