The season had some unusual weather patterns with a slow start for snow fall and then the late winter/early spring dumps of snow for many resorts. The Midwest was challenged with unseasonably mild temperatures and very low snowfall.

Many thanks to our Trip Coordinators and Trip Leaders for volunteering their time and efforts to plan out the trips and leading the groups out to the mountains for our skiing and social adventures. The Trip Reports were a testament to the adventure and fun enjoyed by all.

We have also kicked off our plan for the 2025 ski season. We did evaluate a trip to New Zealand/Australia in September, 2024 but have decided to postpone this trip to Fall 2025 or 2026 to allow more time to plan and promote a unique destination trip such as this. For 2025, we have initiated a proposal for Snowmass (with Aspen nearby) and continue planning for a February trip with Sanctuary Ski Club to Japan. We are also evaluating other leading destinations for the US West and Midwest, Canada, and Europe. The industry ski passes for next season continue their uphill climb in price.

In late February, our long-term monthly meeting venue, the Old Towne Pub in Geneva, unexpectedly closed for business leaving us with the urgent need to search for and evaluate new meeting venues. In support of this, we have scheduled some trial meetings. We met at Sturdy Shelter in Batavia on March 25th and plan to be at Pal Joey's in Batavia on Tuesday, April 16th. We appreciate your patience as we evaluate meeting venues.

We have several upcoming social events and meetups planned. This includes the Northern Illinois Food Bank 5K Walk/Run on April 27th, our End of the Year Party at Hawthorne's Backyard Bar & Grill in West Chicago on May 19th, our first Golf Scramble on June 30th, and the Swedish Days bike ride on July 7th.

We are in the process of updating our Club policies to ensure compliance with current industry and legal trends. These policies will be posted on our website when completed.

The success of our Club is highly dependent on our volunteers for the Board and Executive Committee Chairs, our Trip Leaders and Assistant Trip Leaders, and our

Event Leaders. Volunteering gives in many ways by providing a service to the Club and many benefits for the volunteer such as a sense of purpose and accomplishment, engagement in their individual passions, building relationships, using their skills/experience and perspective to further the Club's mission, and a priority status for trip signups. We currently have open positions for *Executive Committee Chairs for Membership and Social Media and need Trip Leaders for planned 2025 ski trips.*

As I started to write this note up, I was getting ready for our last ski trip of the year to Lake Placid but now that trip is over. It has been an interesting year with a variety of snow conditions - lots of snow in some resorts and complete lack of snow in the Midwest including UP Michigan. Snow reliability may be a factor for our future trip planning.

We want to thank everyone who attended our February trip leader planning meeting and especially to Cathy and Brad for hosting. It was decided that this Fall is too soon for the Australia and New Zealand trip so that will be postponed until 2025. Some of the trips for next year are still tentative, but it was decided that Snowmass for January and possibly Historic Durango, Colorado (with skiing at Wolf Creek Pass & Purgatory), Japan will be in mid-February, and Europe trip hopefully early March. Additionally, we are working on Canada, possibly Silver Star, Kicking Horse, or Sun Peaks, and a potential trip to Lake Tahoe. This is the trip list we are providing for vendor proposals, but this can change completely when the bidding process starts due to availability, pricing, etc. Many times, as we start the process, the vendor may identify a trip that might be a good fit at a reasonable price that we never thought of.

We are still looking for trip leaders for next year as the planning process continues. If you are interested, please contact John or Frank. We would like to get our trip leaders involved in the planning process as soon as possible. We are hoping to have our next planning trip planning meeting sometime in April. Also, if you are interested, the CMSC trip vendor seminar is on May 18th at the Sheraton Hotel in Rosemont.

We look forward to your involvement and input and hope to have more details on the trips as the spring and early summer unfolds.

connecting flight to Kelowna BC. In Kelowna, we went through passport control with a few glitches, but all got through! After a grocery store/liquor stop in Kelowna, we continued on the bus for a 45-minute drive to Big White where we were welcomed by a "bluebird day" (one of few we saw). Arriving at the Inn at Big White, our check-in and luggage portage went smoothly. We also received our lift tickets. All seemed satisfied with their accommodations that included a microwave oven, induction hot plate, refrigerator, and utensils - no complaints! Our rooms included a Queen bed and a Queen Murphy bed that converted into a table when not in use providing extra space.



In the evening, we rode a gondola for our après party at the Happy Valley Lodge where we were greeted by representatives from Big White that provided us with an overview of the resort and answered our questions. Afterwards, we enjoyed the great assortment of hors d' oeuvres and drinks - no one left hungry and the staff took home the remaining leftovers.

Some of us continued to party while others went back to the hotel to enjoy a good night of rest and get ready for skiing the next morning.

On our first day skiing had us all looking for the easiest access from the hotel to the ski trails. Our hotel was not exactly ski-out/ski-in, but just a short walk or navigate a narrow icy trail to skiing. We had an assortment of weather conditions - snowy, foggy, and clear. A few early mornings, we woke up what is call a "Big White-Out" a heavy fog or also called a lowlevel cloud which makes skiing a little tough. This generally clears up during the late morning.



Overall Big White was a great ski destination, a good mix of Green, Blue, and Black runs without long lift lines. On the mountain, we encountered "Snow Ghosts" which are formed on trees by the winds, clouds and fog that blanket the ridge tops.



Big White had a decent selection of bars and restaurants with reasonable prices compared to other ski resorts (on top of that, we benefited with a 25% discount due to the dollar exchange rate). On Sunday afternoon, a group of us attended the Happy Hour in our hotel's Mexican restaurant. The merriment continued to the deck where a few of us partook in enjoying ski shots. We

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continued to party and dance with our newly acquainted Aussie and Swedish friends. Heather and Aeko were particularly popular with their dancing. The party continued to Snowshoe Sam's where we joined another group of Snowdrifters having a great time.



Our last day was a perfect day for skiing, it was great snow, and great weather. In the late afternoon, we met at the Four Aces Bar and Smokehouse for an après ski party that included an assortment of smokehouse menu items and beverages to match. We were even able to get a vegetarian chicken for Denise B. We also, took our trip photo outside Four Aces, what a great group of friends!

That evening we met in the hotel's Rec Room for a Ping-Pong tournament and to have farewell left-over food & drink party.



For the five-day trip to Big White we had a great time, good skiing and parties, and many of us wish to make a return trip there

again. Overall, it was an enjoyable ski resort with friendly people and moderate prices. Best of all, no ski injuries!

Lake Placíd Skí Tríp March 19-24, 2024 Olympic Extravaganza!



Nine Snowdrifters carpooled or got a lift to O'Hare and then flew on to Burlington, VT. There we rented two cars to get to Lake Placid. We were definitely a cozy bunch in the cars with skis and luggage, but travel was smooth and the area is absolutely gorgeous!

Arrival and check in at the Grand Adirondack Hotel was simple, all rooms were ready, and we were pleasantly surprised at the suites we all had on the 6th floor. There

was a great onsite bar (music on the weekend) and restaurant.

While the purpose of the trip, of course, was skiing (more on that later) we all took advantage of taking in the Olympic sites. Two Winter Olympics, 1932 and 1980, took place in Lake Placid. Our first foray into the Olympic sites was to the famous ice arena where the 1980 USA Men's Hockey took the gold – the "Miracle on Ice." We were able to visit the locker room where the USA team and Coach Herb Brooks rallied. The ice rink itself is small – the arena only seats about 7,000. But with the players' names and the retired jerseys of players from that team who have passed prominently displayed around the rink one could feel the history.



We then went to the smaller rink in the arena and learned how to curl.

Our 'coach', Charlie, works for the Olympic Regional Development Authority and gave us a lesson on how to slide the stone, sweep

offensively and defensively, and how to score. We divided up into 2 teams and had a blast!







We enjoyed four days of skiing, Whiteface was much larger and more challenging than any of us expected. We had two powder days and the first day was a bluebird day. There is 3,200 ft. of vertical which is a nice long run from top to bottom. Some of the highlights of the skiing along with lots of laughs are: found a great 2 1/2-mile blue run with views into Vermont and Lake Champlain (although the first time we skied we couldn't see all that) and found a cool warming house and Adirondack chairs after a little hike that had a commanding view of the view of the

mountain. One day rode up the gondola with this person who seemed to know the mountain very well, he seemed nice enough and on the last day while we were leaving he walked up to us and asked how we liked the mountain, turned out he was the General Manager. I think everyone enjoyed the skiing the mountain even though some of it was a bit challenging. More snow came as we left and lots of extreme terrain opened as we left.







Our second Olympic site was back to the ice arena to take in 2 ECAC playoff hockey. We watched St. Lawrence University, Quinnipiac, Dartmouth, and Cornell vie for a spot in the finals. Prior to the games many of us toured the Olympic Museum. Lots of memorabilia from the 2 Olympics – including uniforms, torches, posters. Really a treasure of our Olympic history.

Next, we went to the Olympic Ski Jump Complex. Due to a recent early thaw, there was no jumping. But we could ride a gondola to the top of the hill and then take an elevator up to the top of the jump. Definitely not a spot for those with acrophobia! The view of the entire valley was amazing.



The final

site was to the Mt. Van Hovenberg Olympic Bobsled Run. While there we were fortunate enough to be up close to watch several World Cup Men's & Women's runs! After each run the track is swept and blown and tended so that each run has pristine ice!







Quite a memorable trip!






